



Pupil Premium Spending Plan 2018-2019

Background

The Pupil Premium provides additional funding on top of the main funding a school receives. It is targeted at pupils from disadvantaged backgrounds to ensure they benefit from the same opportunities as pupils from less deprived families. Its purpose is also to raise the attainment of disadvantaged pupils and close the gap between them and their peers. Funding is allocated for children from low-income families who are eligible for Free School Meals (FSM) and children who have been looked after continuously for more than six months. In 2012, the funding was extended to include children who have been eligible for FSM at any point in the previous six years (known as the Ever 6 FSM measure). The Pupil Premium is paid to schools as they are best placed to assess what additional provision their pupils need. This means that schools are free to spend the Pupil Premium as they see fit and are held accountable for how it is used. We have published on-line information about how we have used the funding. This ensures parents and others are made fully aware of the outcomes of pupils covered by the Premium and the extra support they receive.

Our School

In 2018-19, The Brent Primary School will receive £155,760 for Pupil Premium, an increase from the previous year. Our plans for how this will be spent are shown below. Other funding will be added to this to ensure that we support our most disadvantaged pupils.
